SCIENCE IN A COLLECTIVE EUROPE

The transfer project "Science in a Collective Europe" is a subproject of the LOEWE Research Cluster "Conflict Regions in Eastern Europe". The transfer project aims to cultivate new forms of East-West scientific communication and pass on the project results to the interested public. The subproject divides the most important aspects of scientific communication into five rubrics. The fifth subproject is directed expressly towards the general public.

- C1 Annual conferences and workshops in Germany and at partner locations in Kazan and Kyiv promote dialogue between researchers.
- C2 The East-West Tandem Authorship addresses transnational publication formats that will be conducted between colleagues and partners from the wider network.
- C3 This subproject involves the implementation and development of tandem seminars, online courses and university curricula together with international partners.
- C4 Dialogue symposiums in established formats are also scheduled in cooperation with the associated partners of the LOEWE Research Cluster: The Hessian Foundation for Peace and Conflict Studies (HSFK), the Schrader Foundation in Frankfurt, the German Poland Institute (DPI) in Darmstadt as well as the Center for Conflict Studies in Marburg.
- C5 Media Partnerships: Print and other media will accompany the project and its milestone activities.


























The dramatic developments in Ukraine in 2013/2014, the Crimean annexation in 2014 and the subsequent Western sanctions against Russia thrust the continent into a renewed East-West conflict. Despite the Ukrainian-Russian crisis being the most tangible element of this conflict, the other regional conflicts in Eastern Europe which have remained unresolved have also garnered attention. The continued existence of conflict has led to the present-day conclusion that previous miscalculations were caused by inadequate interpretations rather than a lack of factual knowledge. The new LOEWE Research Cluster examines historical as well as modern-day conflict regions in Eastern Europe including and beyond the current Ukrainian-Russian crisis.

RESEARCH MISSION

The aim of this LOEWE Research Cluster is to advance a new typology of conflict regions through direct dialogue with partners in Eastern Europe on the basis of a multiperspective analysis of past and present conflict regions and using frames of reference from historical, linguistic, cultural and social studies.

KEY QUESTION

The LOEWE Research Cluster "Conflict Regions in Eastern Europe" is guided by the principle to establish interpretative insight as a criterion for resolution strategies and to develop new forms of scholarly communication between the East and West, thereby mending the renewed rift in Europe.

- Through which actors and media are conflicts constructed?
- How do conflicts manifest?
- Which dynamics characterize courses of conflict?
- How can competing interpretations be evaluated?

THREE POSTDOC PROJECTS Theory and Methods Base Project

The base project's objectives are comparative in nature, although additional thematic cross-sections are included with a focus on Ukraine. All three objectives focus on the substantial themes of conflict constellations. LOEWE's three fundamental disciplines – social sciences, history and linguistics – encapsulate the research field which is supported by three other adaptable interdisciplinary subjects.
